

Week One Weekly Report

Happy Friday from your government relations team! The Georgia General Assembly kicked off the 2026 Legislative Session Monday, and it was a busy week at the Gold Dome. On the first legislative day, lawmakers set the 40-day session calendar and welcomed new members. Early floor action in the Senate passed the first bill of session which addressed firearm storage and local government authority. Both chambers of the legislature debated immigration enforcement transparency and entertained several community acknowledgments.

Throughout the week, we saw key policy priorities emerge during the annual Eggs & Issues breakfast and Governor Kemp's State of the State address. In this statewide election year that has many legislators running for higher office or reelection, we anticipate a politically charged session and look forward to keeping you updated.

Eggs & Issues

This year's Eggs & Issues covered the top priorities for Governor Brian Kemp, Lt. Governor Burt Jones, and Speaker John Burns.

Governor Kemp outlined several transportation and infrastructure solutions, including a \$1.8 billion budget increase for road capacity improvements and the expansion of express lane construction. The plan also includes a \$200 million investment along GA-316 (University Parkway), \$250 million for local road projects with no local match required, and \$100 million to strengthen bridges in rural areas. In addition, the state will make energy infrastructure investments, including \$35 million for the Natural Gas Improvement Fund through the Georgia Finance Authority. Kemp also announced the creation of a new homelessness response program, which includes a \$50 million Homelessness Response Grant Program, with funding awarded to local governments and nonprofit organizations.

Lt. Governor Burt Jones' priorities focus on strengthening Georgia's workforce and easing financial pressure on residents while improving public safety and family services. His goals include expanding workforce developing partnerships with Georgia colleges, lowering the state income tax, and capping property tax increases at 3%. He also emphasizes combating drugs and fentanyl trafficking and maintaining a continued focus on foster care through the Children and Families Committee.

The Speaker's priorities center on improving affordability, access, and long-term workforce readiness across the state. Key goals include supporting lawsuit reform to help stabilize the legal and business environment, improving insurance affordability and accessibility, and advancing tax relief initiatives for residents. The Speaker also emphasizes addressing the healthcare workforce shortage and strengthening education outcomes by working toward placing a literacy coach in every school.

2026 State of the State Address by Governor Kemp

In his 2026 State of the State, Governor Brian Kemp framed Georgia as fiscally strong and prosperous, touting record reserves, job growth, fully funded schools, and conservative budgeting that has kept taxes low and returned billions to taxpayers. He acknowledged ongoing challenges with everyday costs for families and proposed both short-term relief — including a one-time \$1 billion tax rebate for residents — and long-term tax cuts, such as accelerating a reduction in the state income tax rate below 5 percent. Kemp also

emphasized investments in workforce development, public safety, and education, including pay supplements for state employees and funding for school safety. Infrastructure and quality-of-life issues like congestion and homelessness were highlighted as priorities, while he urged continued fiscal discipline ahead of future uncertainties. His address intertwined policy achievements with broader themes of economic opportunity, conservative governance, and community strength as he looks to conclude his tenure.

Likely Legislative Priorities for the 2026 Session

Likely legislative priorities for the 2026 session include renewed debate over eliminating Georgia's state income tax, which currently generates roughly \$16 billion of the state's \$36 billion general fund, with lawmakers focusing on the timing and structure of any phaseout. Lawmakers are also expected to push for expansion of the foster care support system, particularly for youth aging out of care, with an emphasis on improving housing stability, educational continuity, and workforce readiness. Access to medical marijuana will remain a topic of discussion, as Georgia currently permits use for 17 chronic conditions such as late-stage cancer, Alzheimer's, and PTSD, and legislators anticipate debate over whether to expand eligibility. Property tax relief is another key issue, with House Speaker Jon Burns signaling interest in cutting or eliminating property taxes and expanding certain homestead exemptions. Budget deliberations for Amended FY2026 and FY2027 are also expected to be competitive, as a budget surplus gives legislators additional flexibility to direct funding to district priorities. Finally, technology and artificial intelligence policy is likely to emerge as a major focus, including discussions on protecting minors from harmful effects of AI and determining whether guardrails should be placed on its use.
